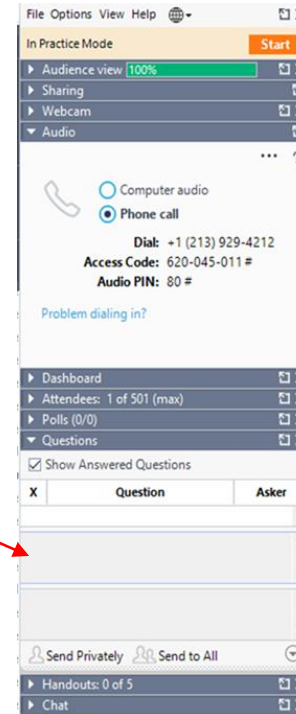

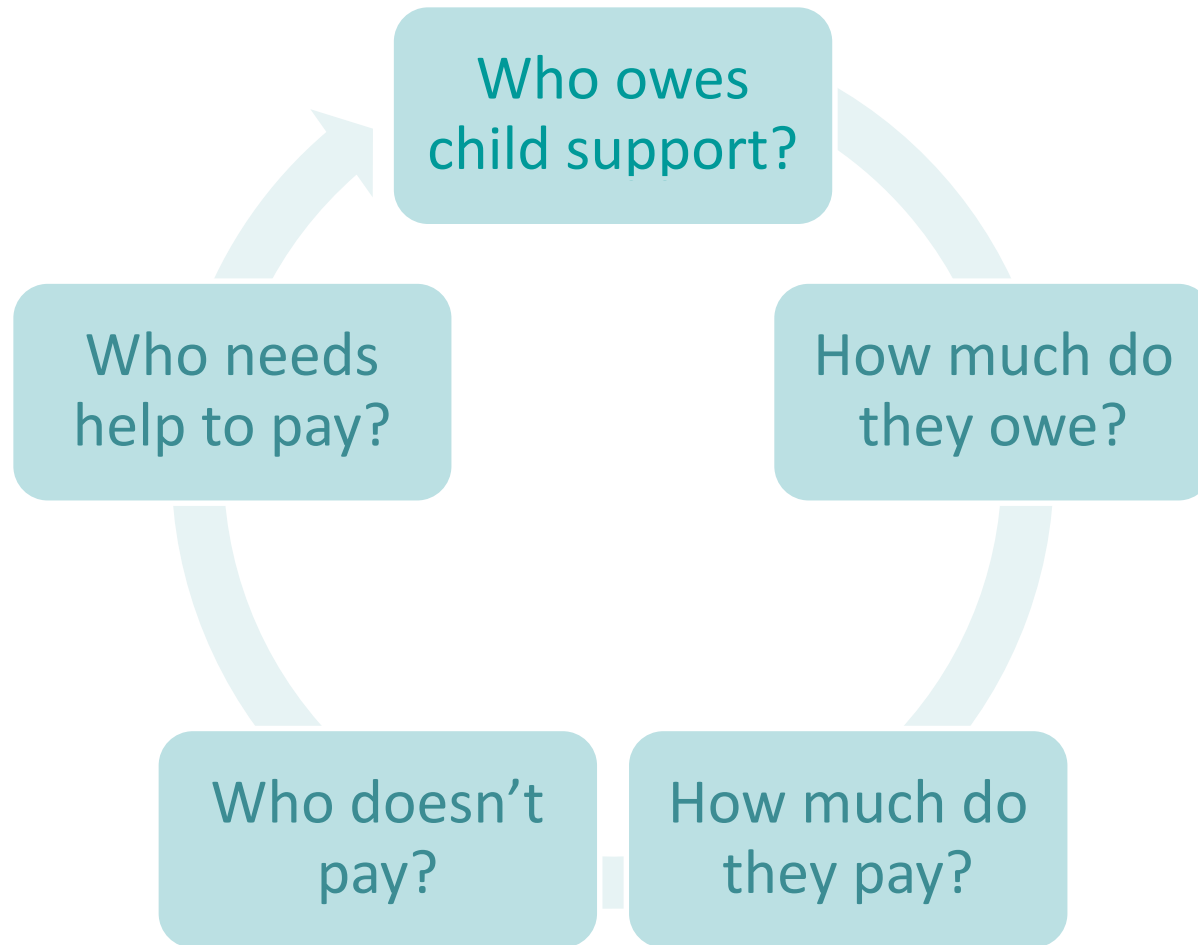
We have partnered with the Maryland Child Support Administration for over 25 years

# Research to Policy Implementation

## Guidelines Committee

Determine changes to child support guidelines and family law.

## Low-income obligor subcommittee

Chair subcommittee to address issues related to low-income obligors

## Legislation

Submitted legislation during 2019 session. Attempt will be made again in 2020.





# Research to Policy Implementation

## Guidelines for Low-Income Families

**For incomes below \$1,250 per month...**

Current Guidelines

- \$20 to \$150

Proposal

- Specify guideline amounts

### Data Supporting Proposal

- **40%** of orders were **above \$150**
- **33%** of orders were for **\$162 or \$163**
- Determined that guidance is necessary





# Research to Policy Implementation

## Income Imputation

### Current Family Law

- Does not define voluntary impoverishment

### Current Practice

- Income imputation is routine for unemployed individuals

### Proposal

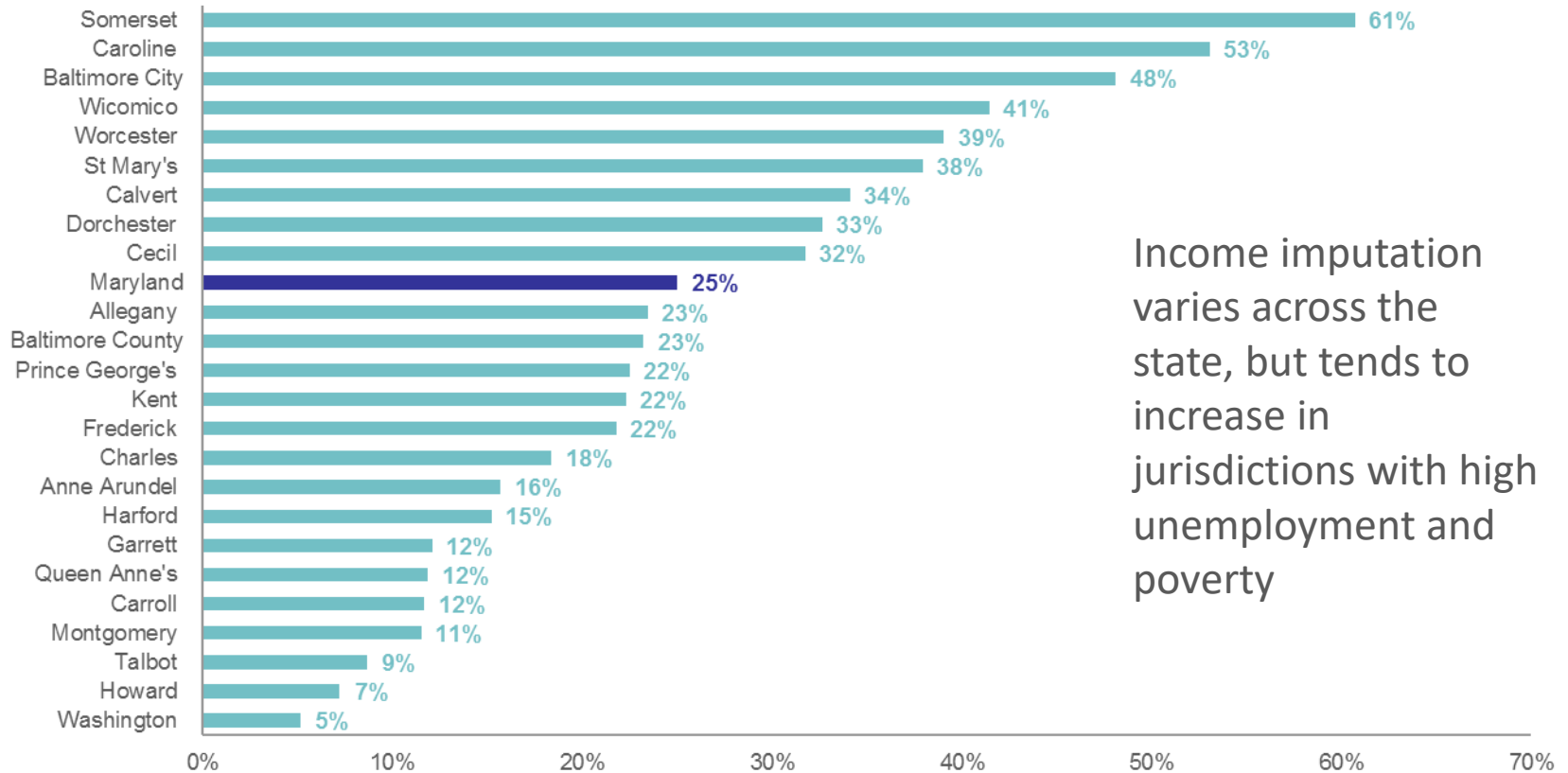
- Include definition in MD Family Law & update potential income





# Research to Policy Implementation

## Income Imputation



Income imputation varies across the state, but tends to increase in jurisdictions with high unemployment and poverty

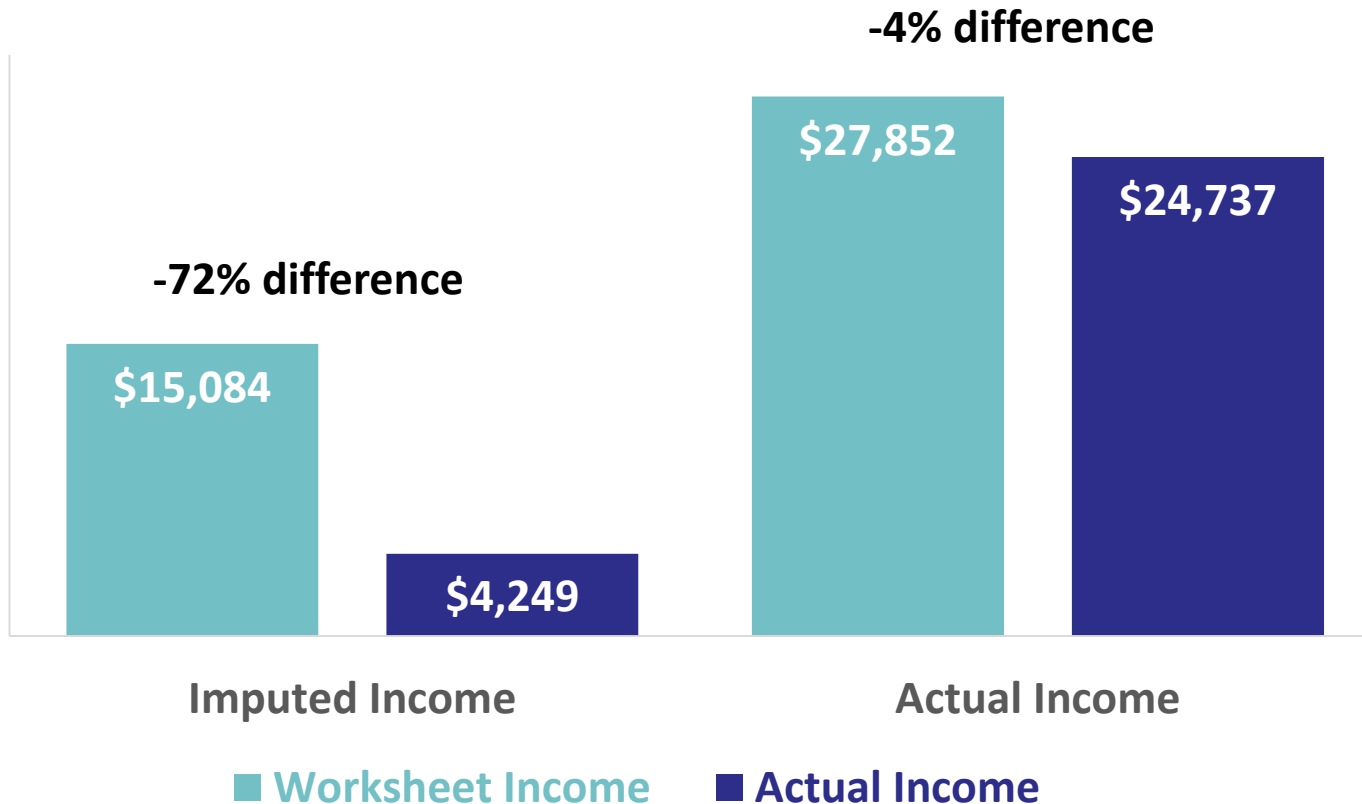

### How Accurate is Worksheet Income

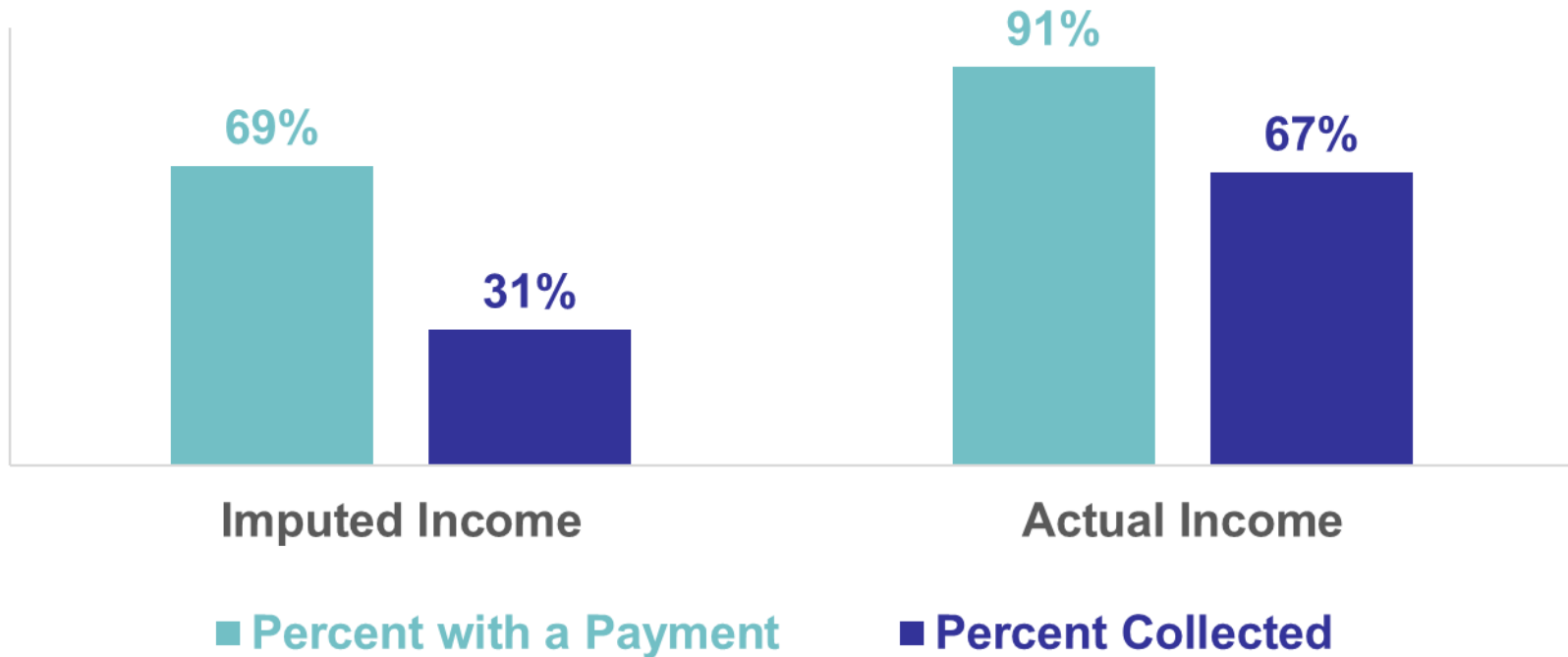

## **Data and Research Driven Policy Development**

***“A high performing child support program is evidence based”***

- Background – July, 2012 Behavioral Economics in Human Services Peer Practicum in Washington D.C. – The Behavioral Interventions to Advance Self-Sufficiency Project (BIAS)
- Understanding Perspectives - Behavioral Interventions in Child Support (BICS) (2014 – 2019)
- Procedural Justice-Informed Alternatives to Contempt (PJAC) (2016-2021)
- Families Forward Demonstration (FFD) (2017-2021)
- “The Journey: A Parent’s Voice” Early Intervention Blended Parenting and Employment Program (“The Journey”) (2019 – ongoing)
- Access and Visitation Grant – Mediated CS and Parenting Time (2012 – ongoing)
- Experience Management Program (2018 – ongoing)
- Strategic Planning Initiative (2017 – on-going)





# Dissemination, Incorporation and Operationalization

- “All Data is Good Data” – a determination of allocation of resources
- A Good Communication Plan is Key
- Findings are the Basis for Change in Operating Philosophy and Drives Training Development, Leadership and Staff Buy-In
- Operationalize Successful Outcomes







# Staff Perspective

## Benefits to Program Staff

- Greater Understanding of Research and Demonstration Projects and How It Impacts our Work
- Greater Organizational Structure Understanding – in navigating the layers, rules and requirements of government and its systems
- Greater Self Awareness
- Greater Client Understanding and Context
- Impact on Agency Staff Perception of Their Work
- Awareness of Resources to Support Clients

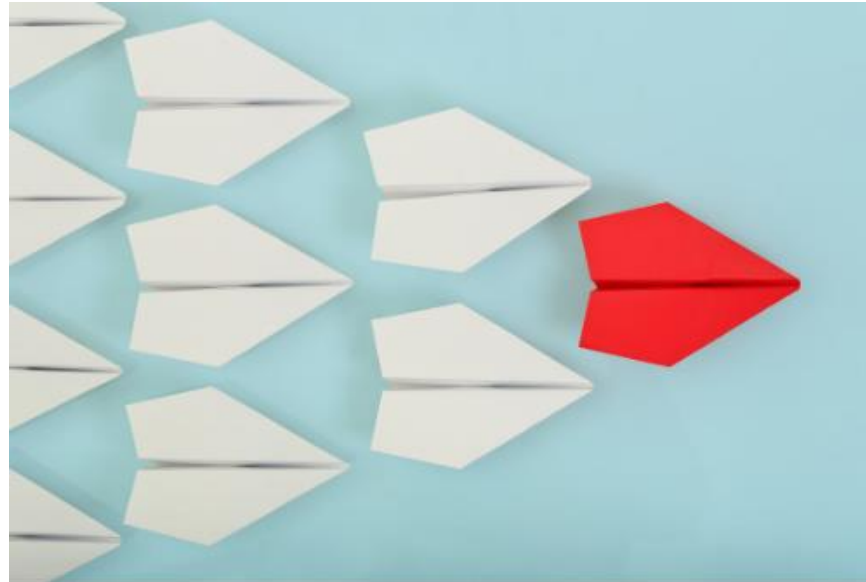
